*Statement under Rule 300*

On September 18, 1996 Chief Minister made a statement regarding the Report of Shri Aravindaksha Menon Commission of Enquiry on Poonchura riots.

*Leave of absence from sittings of the House*

On September 24, 1996 the House granted leave to Shri M. K. Kesavan and Shri V. Balaram to remain absent from the sittings of the second session of the Assembly.

*Government Resolution*

On September 26, 1996 the House unanimously adopted the following Resolution moved by Shri P. R. Kurup, Minister for Forests and Transport.

WHEREAS the Government of Kerala as per Notification No. G.O. (P) 39/73/AD dated the 12th February 1973 issued under Sections 27, 30 and 76 of the Kerala Forest Act, 1961 (Act 4 of 1962) and published as S. R. O. No. 128/73 in Part I Section iv of the Kerala Gazette No. 9 dated the 27th February, 1973, have declared the areas falling within the boundaries specified in the schedule to the said notification as a Wild Life Sanctuary to be known as the 'Parambikulam Wild Life Sanctuary';

AND WHEREAS the Kerala State Electricity Board has now requested the State Government to divert an extent of 14.39 hectares of Forest Land from the Parambikulam Wild Life Sanctuary for the purpose of the Kuriyarkutty-Karappara Hydro Electric Project;

AND WHEREAS the Kerala Forest Department has recommended to the Government for the diversion of an extent of 14.39 hectares of forest land falling within the boundaries of the said Wild Life Sanctuary for the implementation of the said Project;

AND WHEREAS the State Government has agreed to divert an extent of 14.39 hectares of forest land from the area of the said Wild Life Sanctuary for the implementation of the said Project;

AND WHEREAS alteration of the boundaries of the Parambikulam Wild Life Sanctuary is necessary consequent to the diversion of an extent of 14.39 hectares of forest land falling within the boundaries of the said Wild Life Sanctuary;

AND WHEREAS subsection (3) of section 26A of the Wild Life (Protection) Act, 1972 (Central Act 53 of 1972), provides that no alteration of boundaries of a Sanctuary shall be made except on a resolution passed by the Legislature of the State;

AND THEREFOR this House resolves to exclude an extent of 14.39 hectares of Forest land falling within the boundaries of the Parambikulam Wild Life Sanctuary and to alter the boundaries of the said Wild Life Sanctuary as detailed below:—



*North.*—The boundary starts from the point, where Pullakkal Thodu meets with the Karappara River; and thence along the Puliyanpadam, Chirakadavu along the Nelliampathy Range boundary upto the boundary of Tutanpara Coffee Estate and thence runs towards east for about 1 km. along the Nelliampathy Range boundary and thence runs around a strip of land of width 20m. and average length of 1 km. towards east for the open cut portion, and comes back to the Nelliampathy Range boundary thus leaving out an area of 1.99 Ha. from the existing sanctuary area and thence runs along the range boundary till it joins Vetti Ar and thence runs along the bank of the Vetti Ar till it is joined by the Thekkady River and thence running along the Thekkadi Ar in the South direction for about 2 km. leaving a lake of area 12.40 Ha. that will be created due to construction of a small weir and thence returns to the confluence and thence follows upto the Thekkady river to Thekkady reaches through the Nagarnalla upto Kochumalai the interstate boundary between Kerala and Tamil Nadu States.

*East.*—Thence along the interstate boundary through Pandaravaramalai, Mount Stuart, Vengolimalai, Pullakkadav upto the tri-junction point of Palakkad and Thrissur District and Tamil Nadu State.

*South and West.*—Thence along the inter-district boundary between Palakkad and Thrissur Districts running through Mudiyanpara, Vanthoianmala, Karimalagapuram to Orukomban and thence along the river bank of Sholayar to Muduvanchal West, thence along the bank of Karappara river upto the starting point.

*Question of Breach of privilege:*

On September 27, 1996 Hon. Speaker referred to the Committee of privileges for examination and report the notices of Question of breach of privilege given by S/Shri E. M. Augusthy, Johny Nelloor and Dr. M. A. Kuttappan against Shri A. Neelalohithadasan Nadar based on certain remarks made by the latter against Hon. Speaker.

The Kerala Appropriation (Vote on Account No.2) Bill as assented to by the Governor was laid on the Table of the House on September 5, 1996.

#### *III. Reference of Bills to Subject Committees and presentation of Subject Committees Reports:*

Two Bills were referred to Subject Committees and Subject Committee Reports presented thereto.

### *Financial Business*

#### *I. Budget for 1996-97*

The discussion and voting on Demands for Grants in the budget for the Financial Year 1996-97 was commenced on 3rd September, 1996. Thirteen days were allotted for discussion on demands for grants. 35 demands in the budget were discussed by the Assembly and the remaining 9 demands were guillotined on 25th September, 1996.

Out of the 925 cut motions received, 474 were moved and disposed of. There were 252 occasions for speech in connection with the discussion and voting on demands for grants including the reply by the Ministers. The Assembly devoted 61 hours and 39 minutes for transacting financial business relating to the Budget for 1996-97. The details are given in Appendix VIII.

The Appropriation (No.2) Bill, 1996 in respect of the Budget for the year 1996-97 was introduced in the Assembly on September 26, 1996 and was taken into consideration and was passed on the same day.

*II. Supplementary Demands for grants for the year 1996-97 and Demands for Excess Grants for the years 1980-81 to 1988-89*

On September 26, 1996 Shri T. Sivadasa Menon, Minister for Finance laid the Supplementary Demands for Grants for the year 1996-97 and Demands for Excess Grants for the years 1980-81 to 1988-89. The discussion and voting on Supplementary Demands for Grants and Demands for Excess Grants took place on September 27, 1996. The Assembly devoted 1 hour and 39 minutes for this business. 13 members participated in the discussion.

The Kerala Appropriation (No.3) Bill, 1996 in respect of the Supplementary Demands for Grants for the year 1996-97 and the Kerala Appropriation (No.4) to the Kerala Appropriation (No.12) Bills in respect of Demands for Excess Grants for the years 1980-81 to 1988-89 were introduced in the Assembly on September 27, 1996 and was taken into consideration and passed on the same day.

*Private Member's Business*

According to the Calendar of Sittings of the Second Session of the Tenth Kerala Legislative Assembly, Private Members' business was set down for 5 days i.e., September 6, 13, 20, 27 and October 4, 1996. Since the Session was cut short the business set down for September 27 and October 4, 1996 could not be conducted. Out of the 3 days set apart for Private Members' business, September 6 and 20 were set apart for Private Members' Bills and September 13 was set apart for Private Members' Resolutions.

*A. Private Members' Bills*

During the Session, four motions for leave to introduce bills came up before the House. Besides, discussion on motion for leave to introduce four Bills was continued. Of the eight Bills the motion for leave to introduce four Bills were withdrawn by leave of the House on the basis of the assurance given by the Ministers concerned.

The details regarding the name of Members who moved the motion for leave to introduce the Bills and the result thereof are given in Appendix IX and X.

*B. Private Members' Resolutions*

During the Session one resolution given notice of by Shri P. Raghavan was discussed and the discussion was incomplete.

The details regarding the name of Members who moved the Resolution, the text of the Resolution and the result thereof are given in Appendix XI.

The House devoted a total of 3 hours and 05 minutes for transacting the Private Members' Business and 15 Members including Ministers participated in the discussion on Private Members' Business.

## APPENDIX VI

**Salient Features of Important Bills**

**I. THE KERALA SCHEDULED TRIBES (RESTRICTION OF  
TRANSFER OF LANDS AND RESTORATION OF  
ALIENATED LANDS) AMENDMENT  
BILL, 1995**

Section 3 of the Kerala Scheduled Tribes (Restriction on Transfer of Lands and Restoration of Alienated Lands) Act, 1975 invalidates all transfer of immovable property possessed, enjoyed or owned by a member of Scheduled Tribe to a person other than a member of the Scheduled Tribe effected on or after the 1st day of January, 1960 and before the commencement of the said Act i.e. on 1st day of January, 1988. Sub section (1) of section 6 of the said Act provides for the reconveyance of the said land to the concerned tribe. Numerous proceedings are pending before the Revenue Divisional Officers for restoration of possession of tribal lands from non-tribal alienees. Revenue Divisional Officers have reported many impediments on the adjudication of applications filed by the tribals.

2. The eviction of the present occupants of the tribal land is a serious social problem being faced by the Government. The present occupants have made valuable improvements utilising their earnings. If they are evicted, majority of them would become landless and the compensation they get will not be adequate to acquire equal extent of land with improvements. Moreover, when steps are taken to evict the present occupants, they organise themselves to restrict the eviction steps. The rehabilitation of the present occupants is another serious problem that may be faced by the Government in implementing the provisions of the aforesaid Act.

3. Considering these aspects the Government have decided to amend the Act suitably to safeguard interests of both the Scheduled Tribes and the present occupiers.

The salient features of the amendment are:

- (i) Constitution of a fund called "the Scheduled Tribe Rehabilitation and Welfare Fund" and the utilisation of the said fund for the purchase and allotment of land and also for financial assistance to the Scheduled Tribe who has transferred his land during the period between 1-1-1960 and 1-1-1982 and application for restoration has been filed before 31-12-1995 under section 6 of the Act and pending before the Revenue Divisional Officers;
- (ii) exclude the small holders who had purchased an extent of less than one hectare of land from the tribe before the commencement of the Act;

- (iii) give an option to the existing settlers who have acquired from tribes before the commencement of the Act, land which exceeds one hectare, to get themselves excluded from eviction by paying to Government the value of the property as may be fixed by the Revenue Divisional Officers within the time prescribed by the Government;
- (iv) allotment of equal extent of land to the tribe where the extent of land transferred before the commencement of the Act, does not exceed one hectare;
- (v) allotment of proportionate extent of land to the tribals, if the transfer was made before the commencement of the Act and the extent of such land exceeds one hectare where the transferee pays the value of the land to the Government as determined by the Government.

The Bill seeks to achieve the above objects.

## II. THE MALABAR UNIVERSITY BILL, 1996

In response to the long standing and sustained demand by the people of North Malabar to meet their higher educational needs, Government of Kerala decided to establish a new University in that area. The establishment of this new University was also envisaged in the budget speech for 1994-95, wherein it was announced that a new University would be established in the North Malabar area in order to increase the efficiency of the University of Calicut by decreasing the work load of the University of Calicut. It is also felt that the Calicut University which is overburdened can be managed more effectively if a new University is established in the Malabar area.

2. In pursuance of the decision, a task force for submitting recommendations/reports on the need for this University was constituted and the task force in its report recommended the need for a new University in view of the developments in the field of higher education and also considering the population and literacy percentage of Kerala.

3. Two revenue districts of North Malabar, namely Kasaragod and Kannur together with the Mananthavady taluk of Wayanad district were considered for inclusion in the area of jurisdiction of the proposed University. The name Malabar University was suggested and the same has been approved by Government as a recognition of the historical importance of the area. The University is conceived of as a multifaculty and multicampus University in consonance with the modern educational approach and needs.

4. In order to achieve the above object, the Malabar University Bill, 1995, was published as Bill No. 143 of the Ninth Kerala Legislative Assembly. But the Bill could not be introduced in, and passed by, the Legislative Assembly.

5. As the Legislative Assembly of the State of Kerala was not in session and as the above object had to be given effect to immediately, the Malabar University Ordinance, 1995 was promulgated by the Governor of Kerala on the 9th day of November, 1995, and published as Ordinance No. 16 of 1995 in the Kerala Gazette Extraordinary No. 1128 dated the 10th November, 1995.

6. A Bill to replace Ordinance 16 of 1995 by an Act of the State Legislature was published as Ninth Kerala Legislative Assembly Bill No. 157. But the Bill could not be introduced in, and passed by, the Legislative Assembly of the State of Kerala during its session which commenced on the 29th day of February, 1996 and ended on the 19th day of March, 1996.

7. In order to keep alive the provisions of Ordinance 16 of 1995, the Malabar University Ordinance, 1996 was promulgated by the Governor of Kerala on the 26th day of March, 1996 and published as Ordinance No. 6 of 1996 in the Kerala Gazette Extraordinary No. 473 dated the 27th March, 1996.

8. Ordinance 6 of 1996 ceased to operate on the 10th day of July, 1996 as a Bill to replace the said Ordinance by an Act of the State Legislature could not be introduced in, and passed by, the Legislative Assembly of the State of Kerala, within six weeks from the reassembly of the State Legislature as provided in sub-clause (a) of clause (2) of article 213 of the Constitution of India.

9. Difficulties would have arisen if the provisions of the said Ordinance were not given effect to.

10. In order to give effect to the provisions of Ordinance 6 of 1996, the Malabar University Ordinance, 1996 was promulgated by the Governor on the 7th day of August, 1996 with provision for saving of the actions taken under Ordinance 6 of 1996 after its cessation of operation and published as Ordinance No. 7 of 1996 in the Kerala Gazette Extraordinary No. 974 dated the 9th August, 1996.

11. The Bill seeks to replace the said Ordinance by an Act of the State Legislature.
